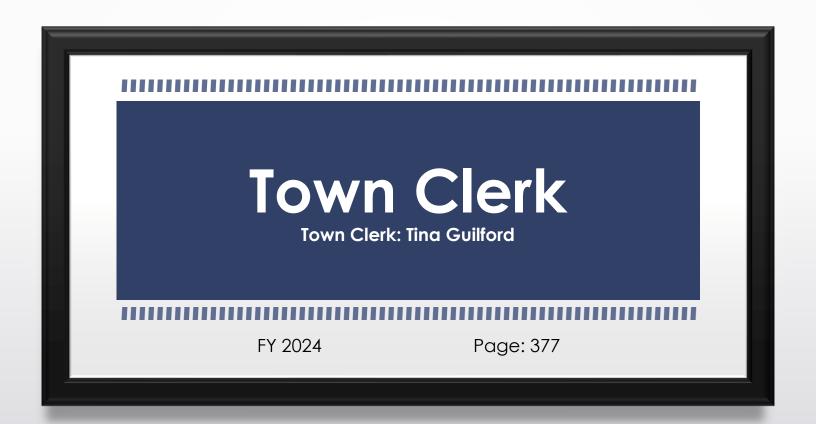

#### Elections – Personnel

Increase from \$52,012 to \$56,752 as a result of going from 3 Elections to 2 Elections in the Fiscal Year, one of which is a Presidential Primary (Close to Presidential Turnout expected). At this time, we have no date for the Presidential Primary and there are multiple bills in Concord to move the September Primary. This is budgeted at 1 polling location.

#### Elections - Personnel

However, personnel is truly based on the number of polling locations. If we increase our polling locations, we increase our costs.

- 3 Locations \$36,245

Increase in hospitality costs for providing the poll workers with breakfast (coffee, donuts), boxed lunch, dinner (pizza) and water/snacks.

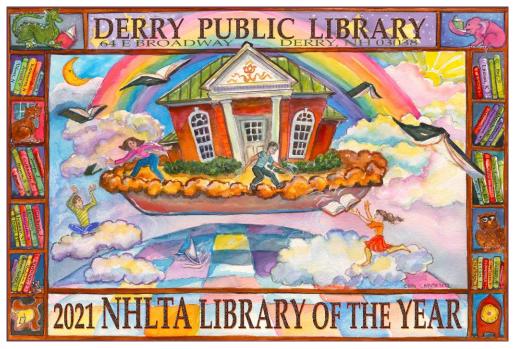

- DPL's FY24 Proposed Budget bottom line is \$1,450,857.00.
- DPL's FY23 Budget bottom line was \$1,409,543.00.
- FY24 reflects an increase of \$41,314.00, or approximately 2.93%

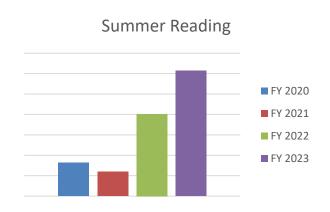

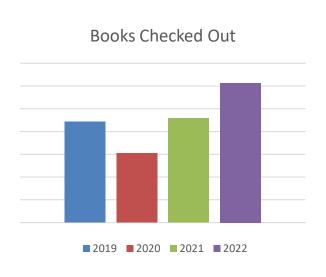

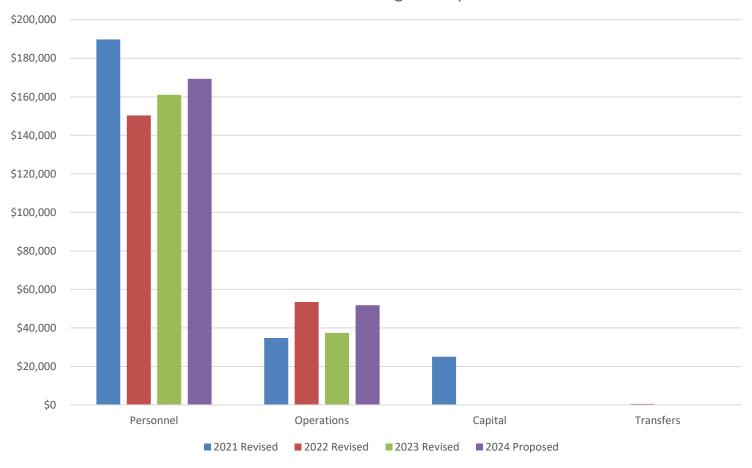








#### FY2021-FY2024 Budget Comparison

#### Recreation – Page 330

- Coordination with 10+ sports organizations
- 100+ events or programs organized annually
- Revenues \$148,056
- Expenditures \$656,549
- All leagues/programs/events were fully operative in FY 23.
- Revenues are based on service fees and trust income.
- Summer Concerts and Fireworks are supported in the FY 24 budget.
- Many expense items have offsetting revenue such as concessions or program fees.

#### Parks - Page 344

- 132 acres of parks maintained
- 9 multi-purpose fields, 8 baseball/softball fields
- 1 beach, 1 splash pad, 2 basketball courts, 5 tennis courts, 2 pickleball courts, 3 playgrounds, dog park and new skate park.
- Revenue \$77,834
- Expenditures \$1,075,875
- Revenues are primarily from use of AC trust (\$71k).
- Laborer position started 1/1/23 requested to keep up with maintenance needs funded by TIF – Hood Park
- Increases in electricity for field lighting and operations
- Expense categories are personnel, field maintenance and related supplies.

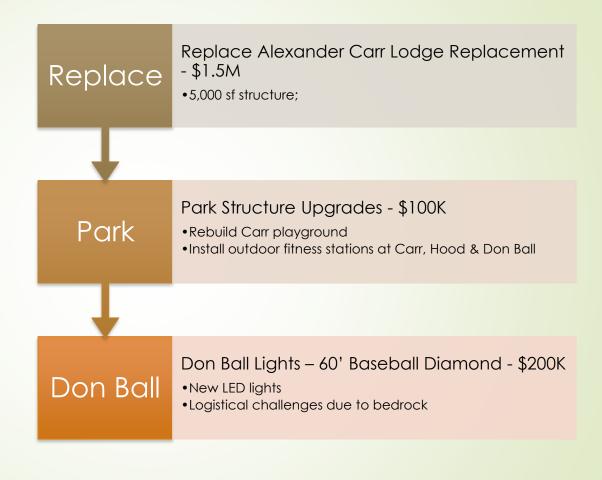

## Overview& Timeline

- Council supports recreation tourism and community development impacts of enhanced facilities.
- Council approved \$1.8M Bond in January 2019. The list of projects have changed significantly through multiple Council actions to adjust the list.
- Council expanded Rte. 28 North to Derry Commerce Corridor TIF District to include Hood Park in May 2019.
- UNH completed Recreation Needs Assessment Survey in March 2020.
- Council expanded Ash Street to Gateway TIF District to include northern segment of rail trail in May 2020.
- Council appropriated \$39K from Parks Facility Funds to augment field improvements during COVID-19 closure in May 2020.
- Original presentation to Town Council on June 9, 2020

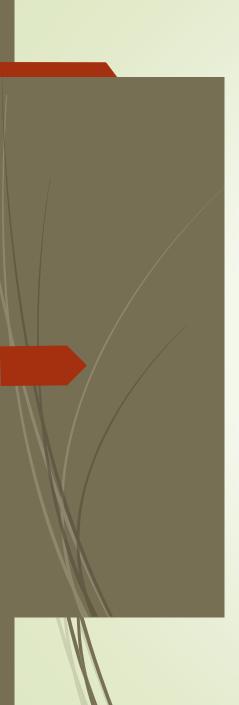
